Time Remains to Respond to 2017 Census of Agriculture

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) needs a Census of Agriculture response from **all** the nation's producers. In order to get an accurate representation of American agriculture — of all farmers and ranchers across the country — NASS will continue to accept completed census questionnaires through spring. NASS has heard that some producers need extra time due to planting, bad weather or gathering necessary end-of-year documents.

All operations are important, and every response matters. NASS is committed to giving producers every opportunity to be represented in this widely-used data. Federal law mandates that everyone who received the 2017 Census of Agriculture questionnaire complete it and return it, even if they are not currently farming. NASS will follow-up through mailings, phone calls and farm visits with producers who have not yet responded.

To avoid these additional contacts, farmers and ranchers are encouraged to complete their census either online here or by mail as soon as possible. Texas Students Got a Jump on the Day for School Breakfast Week

During National School Breakfast Week, TDA's theme *Dive into a Healthy Breakfast* encouraged students to start the day with a healthy meal in the cafeteria. Schools across Texas used TDA resources like selfie

stations and participation charts to engage students and make breakfast a special occasion just last week. TDA also provided menus that featured recipes using Texas products so students could learn how Texas agriculture can make a good breakfast even better. All these materials supported school nutrition teams and their work to energize students' appreciation for the nutritious and appealing breakfasts served in Texas schools.

Research has shown real results for students who increased their participation in the school breakfast program. These students showed



significantly greater increases in their math grades and significantly greater decreases in the rates of school absence and tardiness than children whose participation remained the same or decreased. Excelling in school by eating something healthy and tasty is a win-win for the more than 1.7 million Texas children eating school breakfast.

All of the 2018 National School Breakfast Week materials featured artwork inspired by winners in TDA's 2017-2018 <u>You ART What You Eat</u> statewide student art contest. TDA is currently accepting entries for the 2018-2019 contest. Students in all Texas schools participating in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs are encouraged to enter. Are you currently creating or expanding an agricultural business in Texas? Consider applying for the 2018 Young Farmer Grant (YFG) program. This initiative is administered by TDA under the direction of the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority (TAFA). The purpose of this program is to provide financial assistance in the form of dollar-for-dollar matching grant funds to individuals between the age of 18 and 46 who are engaged or will be engaged in creating or expanding an agricultural business in Texas.
